Introduction

Since its founding, Covington & Burling LLP has been committed not only to the highest professional standards of representation but also to public service. The firm's pro bono program has long been acknowledged as preeminent in the legal community. Over the years, the firm has received recognition both nationally and locally for its contributions to the legal needs of persons and organizations of limited means. *The American Lawyer* magazine has ranked Covington's pro bono practice among nation's top ten for 25 of the past 27 years, including ten years at number one.

Much of Covington's pro bono work reflects the firm's commitment to providing legal services to economically disadvantaged individuals and families in our surrounding communities. While many of Covington's pro bono efforts are anchored in meeting these significant local needs, the firm also has a long history of serving the most vulnerable clients and important causes, regardless of location. The firm handles numerous death penalty and wrongful conviction matters across the U.S., as well as other important civil and human rights matters, including class action litigation and systemic reform projects related to homelessness, LGBT equality, freedom of the press, juvenile justice, mental health, voting rights, veterans' benefits, and government-sanctioned discrimination. Lawyers in all of Covington's offices are also working to advance international human rights and global access to justice, advising hundreds of NGOs focused on improving access to food, water, healthcare, education, economic opportunity, peace, and justice in the world's poorest regions.

Covington is especially proud of its rotation programs in Washington, D.C., which allow attorneys and staff to work for six months at three local legal services organizations. Each year, Covington loans eight associates and two paralegals to local legal services programs for six-month rotations, including at the Neighborhood Legal Services Program (NLSP) in D.C., where the firm pioneered the loaned associate model in 1969. For nearly 50 years, the firm has sent attorneys, paralegals, and secretaries on six-month shifts to NLSP, where they help indigent residents with a full range of civil legal problems, including housing and family law. The firm has since expanded the program to include rotations at the Children's Law Center (CLC) and Bread for the City (BFTC). Associates at BFTC work half-time, chiefly on landlord-tenant cases, while they handle a reduced workload at the firm. At CLC, one lawyer and a paralegal work full-time handling custody and adoption cases.

The CLC rotation is an extension of the firm's Child Welfare Initiative, a program started in 1996 through which Covington has committed substantial resources to the children of the District of Columbia. Another major focus of the Initiative is the firm's partnership with a neighboring public school, Cardozo Senior High School. Activities with Cardozo students include Saturday Academy, a firm-based academic enrichment program, and coaching students for a city-wide mock trial competition. Under the Initiative, we place special emphasis on handling child welfare cases, both through our CLC rotation program and in our regular pro bono work. We also formed the Covington & Burling Public School Project, Inc., a nonprofit offering educational enrichment grants to teachers and staff of the District's public schools.

Our annual Charles F.C. Ruff Awards Ceremony is held each summer at Covington to celebrate the pro bono contributions of firm lawyers. In 2016, the ceremony featured a keynote presentation by Sherrilyn Ifill, the President and Director-Counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund. Recognition was given to attorneys who performed 50 or more hours of pro bono work during the previous year, as well as to two individual lawyers who received

special awards for their outstanding contributions and commitment to the firm's pro bono program: Mark Plotkin and Wallace Lee.

Covington's pro bono program is coordinated by the firm's Pro Bono Counsel, Kelly Voss, and its Pro Bono Managers, Sharmaine Heng, Allison Harris, and Dia Montecillo. They actively seek opportunities to maximize the impact of the firm's pro bono program by matching the skills and interest of our lawyers with important legal needs in our local and global communities.

The following work is illustrative of the firm's pro bono docket in 2016:

Fighting for the Rights of Immigrants

In 2016, Covington broke new ground by establishing an important precedent for immigration advocates, demanding justice for Yemeni Americans ensnared in a systematic passport revocation coercion scheme perpetrated by the U.S. embassy in Yemen. The firm, along with co-counsel, Asian Americans Advancing Justice Asian Law Caucus ("ALC"), represented a naturalized U.S. citizen in the first federal court challenge to interrogations and passport revocations by the U.S. Embassy in Yemen that reached summary judgment. The judge granted summary judgment in favor of our client, holding that it was arbitrary and capricious for the State Department to revoke his passport based solely on a "confession" that the client's undisputed testimony established he did not understand, and that was obtained under coercive conditions.

This case not only serves as important precedent in challenges to passport revocations of naturalized U.S. citizens subjected to coercive interrogations abroad; it was also featured in calls for the State Department's Office of Inspector General to investigate allegations of a pattern of coercive interrogations and revocations of Yemeni-Americans' passports at the U.S. Embassy in Yemen.

Other representative matters of Covington's robust immigration practice include:

- Covington filed an amicus brief on behalf of a group of law professors in support of the plaintiffs in requesting rehearing/rehearing en banc in the Ninth Circuit in *J.E.F.M. v. Lynch*. The brief supports a class of children facing immigration deportation hearings who allege that their constitutionally protected rights to a "full and fair hearing" are being violated when they are not provided with legal representation in their deportation hearings.
- Covington is providing strategic advice to United We Dream, a non-profit organization that advocates on behalf of immigrant youth and families, and in particular undocumented children who have been granted deferred action under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program, often referred to as "DREAMers." The firm also filed an amicus brief in the U.S. Supreme Court on behalf of law enforcement organizations in support of DACA.
- Lawyers in Covington's London office assisted with establishment of the United Kingdom arm of Kids in Need of Defense, through which firm lawyers will represent immigrant children seeking to remain in England.
- Through referrals from Human Rights First, Kids in Need of Defense, Capitol Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition, The Tahiri Justice Center, Her Justice, New York Legal Assistance Group, and other nonprofits, we represent numerous individuals seeking

immigration relief in the form of asylum, U-visas, Violence Against Women Act self-petitions, and battered spouse waivers.

Gun Violence Prevention

Covington has long been a leader in pro bono work to help prevent gun violence, including representing the District of Columbia in the landmark Supreme Court case, *D.C. v. Heller*. In the post-*Heller* world, the firm continues to work on Second Amendment matters with organizations committed to reducing gun violence by keeping firearms out of dangerous hands, including the Brady Center to Prevent Gun Violence, a decades-long pro bono client, and the Law Center to Prevent Gun Violence.

Below are some of the 2016 highlights of our work in this area.

- In collaboration with the Brady Center to Prevent Gun Violence, Covington investigated potential causes of action available against an Alabama pawn shop that sold a gun to a shooter; defended a lawsuit challenging state gun legislation in Maryland; and filed FOIA requests with multiple federal agencies for records related to federal gun control policy. The firm also filed an amicus brief with the Supreme Court in *Voisine v. The United States* on behalf of the Brady Center, arguing that the Court should adopt a broad interpretation of a statute that prohibits any individual convicted of a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence from possessing a firearm.
- Covington attorneys provided the Law Center to Prevent Gun Violence with a range of support, from regulatory advice on potential ATF regulations, to analysis of the CDC's authority to conduct research on gun violence, to drafting amicus briefs in Ninth Circuit litigation supporting the constitutionality of county ordinances prohibiting concealed carrying of firearms in public.
- Covington represented several Virginia public officials in their personal capacity in a business conspiracy lawsuit by gun store owner, and won dismissal of the suit.
- Covington provided the Campaign to Keep Guns Off Campus with advice on means by which the Federal Government might restrict the carriage of guns in the public terminals of airports. Responding to changes in this policy area as they happened, Covington's work ranged from drafting briefing papers for federal agencies, advising on engagement with local governments and front-line federal officials, and helping the client with other strategic matters. For this work, Covington was honored by the Campaign at its annual awards reception in 2016.

Seeking Fair and Humane Conditions for Inmates

Covington and the Washington Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights and Urban Affairs are spearheading transformative change through a series of four groundbreaking reports drafted for policymakers exposing issues within the District's criminal justice system. Covington's reports were unusual in that they reflected consultation with key governmental stakeholders as well as prisoners, defendants and criminal justice advocates, and were focused on spurring dialogue and proposing viable solutions for a range of issues involving the District's criminal justice system. In 2016, Covington released a report entitled "D.C. Women in Prison: Continuing Problems and Recommendations for Change," which provides an in-depth look at the experience of women who are incarcerated both in the District's Correctional Treatment Facility

and in federal prisons, where many D.C. women convicted of felonies serve their sentences. Other reports have addressed racial disparities in arrests, conditions of confinement, the collateral consequences of arrest and conviction, and issues of mental illness.

During 2016, a large team worked to secure reasonable accommodations for deaf and hearing-impaired inmates in Michigan. Covington attorneys conducted a pre-complaint investigation and settlement negotiations in a suit against the Michigan Department of Corrections. Covington filed and argued motions for class certification and summary judgment which are currently pending. Victories in both motions would lead to an injunction requiring Michigan, for the first time, to provide reasonable accommodations in life-saving and critical areas for Michigan's deaf and hard of hearing inmates.

In early 2014, Covington joined forces with the Southern Poverty Law Center and the National Prison Project of the ACLU to represent a class of East Mississippi Correctional Facility ("EMCF") prisoners in a suit alleging that the deplorable conditions at EMCF violate the Eighth Amendment. Inmates at the EMCF have long suffered in conditions that shock the conscience. Under the failed stewardship of the Mississippi Department of Corrections, EMCF inmates live in abject squalor, suffer solitary confinement under abusive conditions, receive grossly inadequate medical and mental health care, and live in fear of violence from guards and other inmates. During 2016, Covington attorneys toured the facility with expert witnesses, assisted in finalizing those experts' reports, and handled discovery, including taking and defending numerous depositions of prison staff, state and private contractor administrators, inmates, and expert witnesses. Discovery closes in mid-2017 and the case is scheduled for a January 2018 trial.

Securing Stability for Veterans

Continuing its longstanding commitment to pro bono representation of veterans, Covington in 2016 won numerous cases in the U.S. Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims (CAVC) in matters referred by the National Veterans Legal Services Program. Under a pro bono partnership launched in 2015, Covington and Eli Lilly & Company collaborated on five CAVC appeals. Covington also represents the National Veterans Legal Services Program in legislative advocacy and policy efforts.

Firm attorneys volunteer at the Swords to Plowshares Veterans Legal Clinics to provide counseling, assistance and representation on VA benefits claims and military discharge upgrades.

Guantánamo Detainees

Covington has been involved in Guantánamo-related litigation for the past thirteen years. The firm obtained favorable rulings in habeas cases on behalf of five detainees at Guantánamo, one of whom died in his cell under uncertain circumstances. Eleven additional firm clients have been released. The firm continues to represent its two remaining detainee clients in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia.

In September of 2016, five firm clients were among the 15 detainees resettled to the United Arab Emirates. All five had been held at Guantanamo since 2002. All were approved for transfer by the unanimous consent of six federal agencies, including the Departments of Defense, Homeland Security, Justice, and State; the Joint Chiefs of Staff; and the Office of the Director of National Intelligence. One client was approved for transfer as early as 2009, while

the other four were approved for transfer by administrative hearings (similar to parole hearings) between 2014 and 2016. Earlier in 2016, six other firm clients had been resettled: two in Montenegro, two in Oman, one in Saudi Arabia, and one in the United Arab Emirates.

In addition to the ongoing proceedings, our previous efforts have included: acting as co-counsel in *Boumediene v. Bush*, which held that the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus extends to detainees held at Guantanamo Bay; filing amicus briefs and coordinating the amicus effort in *Hamdan v. Rumsfeld*; and advocating on behalf of our clients' rights to obtain exculpatory evidence from the government, to be told of the allegations against them, and to confront their accusers.

The James C. McKay Pro Bono Award

In 2011, the Firm established the James C. McKay Pro Bono Award, a tribute to Jim McKay's robust and effective pro bono practice following his transition from commercial practice. The McKay Award is awarded periodically to senior counsel who have followed Jim's example through extraordinary commitment to pro bono practice after transition from full-time commercial law practice. Bill Livingston received the McKay Award in 2011, Martin B. Gold in 2013 and Carolyn Corwin in 2015.

Asylum/Immigration

A.M. We will represent A.M., an Ethiopian national, in pursuing asylum on the basis of LGBT discrimination in his home country. This matter was referred by CAIR Coalition.

A.N.V.M. Representation in an immigration proceeding before the Arlington Immigration Court, including immigration relief pursuant to Special Immigrant Juvenile Status.

A.S. We successfully obtained asylum for A.S., an Ivory Coast national, on the basis of LGBT discrimination in his home country.

A.Y.Z.A. Client is undocumented immigrant child, for whom we will seek Special Immigrant Juvenile Status and file an application for Lawful Permanent Resident status.

Bay Area Legal Aid - N.D. We are assisting the client with the preparation of an I-918 U Visa Nonimmigrant Status Petition, including preparing a declaration and collecting additional supporting documentation as appropriate. The matter was referred to the firm by Bay Area Legal Aid.

Bronx Defenders - LGBT Asylum Case. In a matter referred by the Bronx Defenders, we represent a detained immigrant in proceedings related to his detention and his asylum application before the U.S. Immigration Court.

Capital Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition. We assist the Capital Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition (CAIR Coalition) with client intake at local jails.

Capitol Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition - C.B.. We represent a fourteen-year-old refugee from El Salvador in immigration proceedings involving an application for asylum.

Capitol Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition - G.M. In a matter referred by the Capitol Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition, we are assisting an El Salvador national with her immigration proceedings.

Capitol Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition - M.G. We represent M.G., a Mexican national, in his application for U Visa immigration relief, having successfully represented him in his removal proceedings, which were terminated.

Capitol Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition - P.S. Our client, a Honduran national, is seeking to withhold removal and protection against removal under the Convention Against Torture.

Catholic Charities Community Services - Asylum Clinic. Covington attorneys assisted clients in assessing their eligibility for immigration relief at a series of brief advice clinics hosted by Catholic Charities.

Catholic Charities Immigration Legal Services - C.R. We filed and successfully completed a U-Visa application on behalf of C.R. with a request for employment authorization under the Violence Against Women Act.

D.F.M. - U Visa Application. We provided legal assistance to client in connection with the preparation and submission of a nonimmigrant U Visa application to USCIS.

G.M., D.M. We are representing low-income individuals in connection with a petition for legal guardianship and immigration relief in the form of "Special Immigrant Juvenile Status." This matter was referred to us by Kids in Need of Defense (KIND).

Good Samaritan Advocates - Legal Clinic. Firm attorneys volunteer at the Good Samaritan Advocates' legal clinics. In this role, the attorneys provide short-term limited legal services to clinic participants, most typically related to immigration issues.

Her Justice - A.S. We are assisting in the preparation of client's VAWA self-petition, along with her adjustment of status and work authorization applications to the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

Her Justice - H.S. In a matter referred by Her Justice, we represent domestic violence survivor H.S. in her VAWA self-petition and related applications to USCIS.

Her Justice - M.A. We assisted a female survivor of domestic violence in filing her U Visa petition with the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services Department.

Her Justice - N.C. We assisted a client from Ecuador in completing a VAWA self-petition.

Her Justice - N.N. In a matter referred by Her Justice, we are assisting client from Mexico to obtain a U Visa.

Her Justice - V.D. In a matter referred by legal services provider Her Justice, we are assisting the client with her VAWA self-petition for permanent legal resident status to the USCIS.

Human Rights First - B.A. We represented B.A., a citizen of Sudan, in considering an application to the Secretary of Homeland Security for an exemption from terrorism-related grounds for inadmissibility.

Human Rights Watch - Immigration Research. We provided legal research to Human Rights Watch for a report on the impact of transferring individuals to private detention centers, often outside of the federal circuit in which an individual resides, pending their immigration proceedings.

Human Rights Watch - J.E.F.M. v. Jefferson Sessions, et al. We filed an amicus brief in the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals on behalf of Human Rights Watch in J.E.F.M. v. Lynch. The brief argues that the district court should have jurisdiction over a class action complaint in which plaintiff children argue that due process requires the appointment of free legal representation in deportation proceedings. The Ninth Circuit held that the district court lacked jurisdiction. The J.E.F.M. plaintiffs' petition for rehearing/rehearing en banc is currently pending.

Immigration Matter. We are preparing a battered spouse waiver to be submitted to the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. This matter was referred by Tahirih Justice Center.

J.M.C., S.M., We are representing the clients in an immigration proceeding before the Arlington Immigration Court, including immigration relief pursuant to Special Immigrant Juvenile Status or asylum.

Kids in Need of Defense - C.M. and R.B. We are representing two clients in related immigration proceedings, including immigration relief pursuant to Special Immigrant Juvenile Status.

Kids in Need of Defense - D.M.. We represent D.M. in his application to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services for Special Immigrant Juvenile Status and for a green card.

Kids in Need of Defense - J.J. and I.J. The firm has been representing two siblings seeking asylum in the United States. They were living in Guatemala without any adult immediate family members and traveled to the United States after their father received death threats against their lives from a gang. One of the siblings has been granted asylum and is now eligible to become a lawful permanent resident. We are continuing to seek legal working status and asylum for the other sibling.

Kids in Need of Defense - J.L. & A.L. We successfully represented one individual in a custody proceeding in Prince George's County Circuit Court and another individual in immigration proceedings and in obtaining Special Immigrant Juvenile Status. We are representing the latter individual in pursuit of permanent residency before U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

Kids in Need of Defense - M.B. We are representing M.B. in connection with a Special Immigrant Juvenile Status proceeding.

Kids in Need of Defense - M.M. We are representing a young girl from El Salvador in immigration proceedings, including immigration relief pursuant to Special Juvenile Immigration Status.

Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights of the San Francisco Bay Area - B.S. We filed an affirmative asylum application on behalf of B.S., a Guatemalan national.

Legal Aid Justice Center - Amicus Brief on Asylum Applications. We drafted and filed an amicus brief in an immigration case currently before the Board of Immigration Appeals. The brief discussed whether an asylum applicant has satisfied certain requirements for seeking immigration asylum in the United States if he can show that he was persecuted because of his membership in a family.

Legal Aid Justice Center - M.F. We are representing an El Salvador national and her three minor children in related immigration proceedings.

Legal Aid Justice Center - O.R. In conjunction with the Legal Aid Justice Center, we are representing O.R., a Guatemalan national, in her immigration proceedings, including an asylum application.

Legal Aid Justice Center - Wage Theft Suit. We are co-counseling with the Legal Aid Justice Center to litigate claims against a forestry company and its owners arising from their failure to pay legal wages to workers recruited under the H-2B visa program.

Legal Aid Society of San Mateo. Firm attorneys volunteered with the International Institute of the Bay Area's Application for Citizenship Workshop, organized by the Legal Aid Society of San Mateo.

M.A. We advised a Sudanese national regarding his application to the U.S. for a work visa.

M.E.M. We are representing the client in her immigration matter, including filing for immigration relief for Special Immigrant Juvenile Status.

M.H. We are representing an El Salvadoran national in connection with application for asylum and related immigration proceedings. This matter was referred to us by Public Counsel.

M.M.L. We are preparing a U Visa application to the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

M.P. We represent the client in ongoing immigration proceedings before the Executive Office of Immigration Review.

M.R., D.R. We represent the client in immigration proceedings before the San Francisco Immigration Court. As part of this representation, we may represent the client's mother in a California State Court child custody case.

Major Cities Chiefs Association Supreme Court Amicus Brief. We filed an amicus brief in the U.S. Supreme Court on behalf of law enforcement organizations in support of the Obama Administration's policy of granting deferred action to certain undocumented immigrants.

MFY Legal Services - N.K. On behalf of an undocumented immigrant child, we obtained Special Immigrant Juvenile Status and filed an application for Lawful Permanent Resident status with U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

New York Legal Assistance Group - M.D. We represented M.D. in her petition for asylum in the United States. In August 2015, the client was granted asylum. We continue to work on her adjustment of status paperwork.

Ninth Circuit Amicus Brief - J.E.F.M. v. Lynch. We filed an amicus brief on behalf of a group of law professors in support of the plaintiffs in requesting rehearing/rehearing en banc in the Ninth Circuit in J.E.F.M. v. Lynch. The brief addresses the constitutional principles underlying the interpretation of certain jurisdictional statutes. Our brief supports a class of children facing immigration deportation hearings in a case which alleges that the class of children's constitutionally protected rights to a "full and fair hearing" are being violated when they are not provided with legal representation in their deportation hearings.

Ninth Circuit Appointment - C.E.P. We are representing C.E.P. in a mediation concerning a removal proceeding.

Ninth Circuit Appointment - J.M. We were appointed by the Ninth Circuit to serve as pro bono counsel to J.M. in his appeal of a Board of Immigration Appeals decision denying his asylum petition and request to reopen his application. Covington submitted full briefing to the Ninth Circuit on behalf of J.M. Claire Dean participated in oral argument on August 1, 2016 with an active bench. On August 15, 2016, the Ninth Circuit found that the Board of Immigration Appeals improperly applied the standard for considering whether changed country conditions in J.M.'s home country warranted rescission of his removal order. The Ninth Circuit remanded the matter to the Board of Immigration Appeals to apply the proper standard.

Ninth Circuit Appointment - R.G. We represented R.G. in a Ninth Circuit appeal for asylum and for withholding of removal.

P.R. We will be representing the client in withholding of removal in immigration court.

R.A. We represent R.A., an El Salvador national, in her application for U Visa immigration relief.

S.A. We represent S.A. in her application for a U Visa to the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

Southern Poverty Law Center - Nunag-Tanedo, et al. v. East Baton Rouge Parish School Board, et al. A Ninth Circuit panel affirmed a jury verdict in favor of our client, a class of Filipino teachers recruited to work for Louisiana school districts under "H-1B" guest worker visas. In 2010, Covington, along with the Southern Poverty Law Center and the American Federation of Teachers, sued a California recruiting firm and its president for misleading the teachers about the fees they would need to pay to obtain jobs in the U.S. The case went to trial in December 2012. After six days of testimony, the jury awarded \$4.5 million in damages to the class. Covington took the lead in defending the jury's award on appeal. Less than a month after oral argument, the Ninth Circuit unanimously affirmed.

Supreme Court Law Professors Amicus Brief - Jennings v. Rodriguez. We filed an amicus brief on behalf of a group of constitutional and immigration law professors in support of the respondents in the U.S. Supreme Court case, Jennings v. Rodriguez. We support the respondents' position that three immigration detention statutes require bond hearings for immigrants detained for periods of six months or longer.

Tahirih Justice Center - C.V. We have succeeded in obtaining a U Visa for C.V., a victim of domestic violence. We are now assisting her with an application to adjust her visa status.

Tahirih Justice Center - L.P. We assisted the client in filing for U Visa immigration relief with U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. This matter was referred by Tahirih Justice Center.

Tahirih Justice Center - Y.A. Covington attorneys are assisting a victim of domestic violence in preparing and filing a U Visa immigration application with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

United We Dream Network Inc.. We are providing strategic advice to United We Dream, a non-profit organization that advocates on behalf of immigrant youth and families, and in particular undocumented children who have been granted deferred action under the DACA program ("Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals"), often referred to as "DREAMers."

V.N. We are assisting the client in applying for a B-2 immigration visa to allow her child to remain in the United States to continue medical treatment for leukemia.

Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts - R.E. We are assisting R.E. with his application for an O-1 visa. .

Whitman-Walker Clinic - D.M. We represent the client seeking asylum in the United States with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

Whitman-Walker Clinic - T.H. We represent a client seeking asylum in the United States with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

Civil Rights/Civil Liberties

American Civil Liberties Union - Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender & AIDS Project.

Covington assisted the ACLU LGBTAP in evaluating legal strategies to challenge regulations promulgated by the DoD and each military service that prevent the enlistment, re-enlistment and retention of transgender individuals. In addition to conducting research and providing advice, we drafted requests to the Surgeons General of several of the services seeking elimination of the ban on retention of transgender service members and prepared a request to the Army to change the gender marker for a transgender soldier. In 2015, the Secretary of Defense announced creation of a working group to study the policy and readiness implications of welcoming transgender persons to serve openly. The Pentagon eliminated the ban on transgender service members in 2016.

American Civil Liberties Union - Ortega Melendres v. Arpaio. Since 2010, we have represented a class of Latinos in Maricopa County, Arizona, in *Melendres v. Arpaio*, asserting racial profiling claims. In December 2011, a federal judge granted class certification and partial summary judgment on the clients' Fourth Amendment claims that the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) unlawfully searched and arrested Latinos, based only on a suspicion of unlawful presence in the U.S. The court preliminarily enjoined MCSO from engaging in this practice. In September 2012, the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit affirmed the preliminary injunction. The panel held that unlawful presence in the U.S., by itself, is not a crime, and that, while unlawful presence is a federal civil violation, the sheriff lacks authority to enforce federal civil immigration law. The panel also concluded that the District Court did not err in deciding, for purposes of issuing the preliminary injunction, that the named plaintiffs have standing and that the class they represent should be certified. Trial on the Fourteenth Amendment claims took place in July and August 2012. In May 2013, the District Court issued a comprehensive liability decision in plaintiffs' favor, finding that defendants violated the Fourth Amendment, Fourteenth Amendment, and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The Court also issued a permanent injunction against defendants. In October 2013, the Court issued a supplemental permanent injunction ordering various remedies for the constitutional violations. The District Court appointed a monitor to oversee implementation of these remedies, and plaintiffs are working with the monitor and defendants to ensure compliance with the Court's orders. In April 2015 the Ninth Circuit largely affirmed the District Court's 2013 judgment and injunction order. The District Court held an evidentiary hearing in April and September-November 2015 on the issue of whether the Sheriff and certain employees should be held in contempt for violating the Court's preliminary injunction and other orders. In 2016, the Court found the Sheriff and two others in contempt, issued further injunctive relief to reform the MCSO's internal affairs investigation process, and recommended criminal prosecution of the Sheriff for the contempt.

American Civil Liberties Union of Northern California - Pregnancy Testing. We, as co-counsel with the American Civil Liberties Union of Northern California, favorably settled a lawsuit against the Alameda County Sheriff's Office concerning their policy of mandatorily pregnancy testing all women booked into the Alameda County Jail.

Asian Law Alliance - M.O. We successfully represented M.O. regarding an investigation by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of California. The investigation related to alleged false statements on a passport application.

Asian Law Caucus - Mosed Shaye Omar. We represented Mosed Shaye Omar, a U.S. citizen whose passport had been revoked at the U.S. Embassy in Yemen solely on the basis of

a statement he signed in which he purportedly confessed that “Mosed Shaye Omar” is not his real name. In April 2015, Covington and ALC brought suit in the Northern District of California against the U.S. State Department on behalf of Mr. Omar. Our case was the first to be filed challenging this practice on due process and Administrative Procedure Act grounds, and advocates across the country have been following it closely. The court granted summary judgment in favor of Mr. Omar.

Black Lives Matter Founders. We represent Alicia Garza, Patrisse Cullors, and Opal Tometi—the co-founders of Black Lives Matter. Our representation includes, among other things, advice related to entity formation and trademark rights.

Brennan Center For Justice. We are advising the Brennan Center for Justice concerning a potential challenge to the recent suspension of automatic restoration of voting rights to convicted felons.

Center for Constitutional Rights - Floyd, et al. v. City of New York, et al. We represent (with co-counsel the Center for Constitutional Rights) a class of plaintiffs that challenged the New York Police Department's policies and practices of stopping and frisking pedestrians on the basis of their race or ethnicity, and without reasonable suspicion. In August 2013, after a nine-week bench trial, the District Court issued two Opinions and Orders finding that these policies and practices violate class members' rights under the Fourth Amendment and the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment, and granting injunctive relief that included appointment of a monitor to facilitate development of appropriate remedies. The City appealed to the Second Circuit. In late 2014, the City voluntarily withdrew its appeal. The parties are now working with the court-appointed monitor to develop remedies consistent with the District Court's August 2013 Opinions and Orders.

Coalicion de Derechos Humanos. Represent Coalicion de Derechos Humanos (also known as Derechos) in filing an amicus brief in a Ninth Circuit appeal, supporting the position of plaintiff A.R., the mother of J.A.E.R., in her lawsuit against a U.S. Border Patrol agent who shot J.A.E.R. to death while J.A.E.R. was on the Mexican side of the U.S.-Mexico border.

E.T. We represent E.T. in seeking reinstatement to the Air Force Academy. E.T.'s discharge from the Academy was related to his participation as a confidential informant in investigations conducted by the Air Force's Office of Special Investigation into sexual abuse and other misconduct.

J.B. In a matter referred by New York Legal Assistance Group, we will file a claim in federal court on behalf of J.B. against her employer for sex discrimination based on her status as a transgender woman.

J.R. We represent a transgender employee challenging his employer's categorical exclusion of treatment and care for gender dysphoria in its health care plan.

J.T. We have been engaged as pro bono counsel to defend an indigent defendant in a civil action against the alleged violation of California Penal Code section 632(a), which prohibits recording "confidential communications."

Legal Aid Society NYC - C.C. We represented C.C. in Fair Labor Standards Act and discrimination action against his former employer and reached a satisfactory settlement.

Legal Aid Society NYC - M.E. We represented M.E., a former bus matron, in a civil litigation brought by a child on her bus route.

M.G. We have been appointed by the Ninth Circuit as pro bono counsel to represent a California prisoner in an appeal from summary judgment in an action alleging deliberate indifference to his medical needs.

Morningside Cmty. Org., et al.. We will investigate and bring Fair Housing Act and constitutional challenges to Wayne County, Michigan, and the City of Detroit's practice of conducting mass tax foreclosures based on over-assessed property values, which has a disparate impact on African-American homeowners.

N.C., B.C. We are representing a minor and his grandmother in a civil lawsuit against the San Francisco Police Department for use of excessive force.

NAACP Baltimore City Branch. In conjunction with the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, we represent BRIDGE, a Baltimore-based nonprofit interfaith organization focused on racial and economic injustice, and a Baltimore resident, in a Title VI administrative challenge to Maryland Governor Larry Hogan's decision to cancel the Red Line light rail, which was to serve predominantly African American West Baltimore, and to redirect the funding to road projects in other parts of the state, especially the affluent Washington D.C. suburbs.

NAACP Legal Defense Fund. We advised the NAACP Legal Defense Fund about possible litigation in Texas, Alabama, South Carolina, Georgia and Louisiana, to redress issues such as vote suppression and voter disenfranchisement, and provided spot research on such issues on Election Day 2016.

NAACP-Alabama, Greater Birmingham Ministries. In coordination with co-counsel, the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, we have filed suit challenging Alabama's Photo ID law under the Voting Rights Act and the Equal Protection clause of the U.S. Constitution. We defeated a motion to dismiss and are proceeding through fact and expert discovery.

National Center for Lesbian Rights - C.S. and L.S. We represent a Tennessee couple in coverage litigation seeking payments owed under a homeowner's insurance policy for fire loss resulting from an alleged hate crime.

Ninth Circuit Appointment - R.M.R. We have been appointed by the Ninth Circuit as pro bono counsel to R.M.R. in her appeal of a district court order granting summary judgment in favor of her former employer, Alameda County, on her claims of age discrimination, harassment, and retaliation.

P.B. We represent P.B. in a prisoner civil rights matter. The case is on appeal before the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit.

P.T. We represent prisoner P.T. in his civil rights claim under 42 USC 1983 against the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. Mr. T alleges that he was denied appropriate medical treatment by prison medical staff and that he was assaulted by correctional officers.

S.K. We represent S.K. in connection with its pending civil lawsuit against The Dept. of Health & Mental Hygiene of the City of New York, Bureau of Early Intervention.

The Gill Foundation. We provided legal and policy analysis for the Gill Foundation, one of the nation's leading organizations supporting the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender community. We advised Gill in preparing for a strategic summit it hosted with the Silicon Valley Community Foundation, the nation's largest community foundation. The event focused on strategic initiatives for advancing LGBT equality through legislation, litigation, and public advocacy. Eric Holder delivered the keynote speech at the summit, which was attended by senior leaders of most of the major tech companies. The Covington team comprised partners Eric Holder and Jean Veta, and associates Erika Skougard, Josh Rovenger, and Jeff Bozman. Jean led the team and attended the summit with Eric.

U.S. District Court for the District of Maryland - D.S. The firm was appointed by the U.S. District Court for the District of Maryland to represent D.S. in an action filed against Officer A.H. and others under Section 1983, alleging violations of his rights under the 8th and 14th Amendments. The case went to trial in February 2016, and the jury found no violation of Section 1983. The case is now closed.

Washington Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights & Urban Affairs - C.T. We represent C.T., a former employee of the Washington, DC Department of Corrections, who filed suit in federal court alleging sexual harassment and harassment.

Washington Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights & Urban Affairs - Y.M. We are filing a lawsuit under the Washington, DC Family Medical Leave Act on behalf of a client who was wrongfully terminated for taking time to care for her sick child.

Whitman-Walker Health - MSM Blood Donation Ban. We assisted Whitman-Walker Health in drafting public comments addressing FDA's policy concerning blood donations by men who have had sex with another man.

Criminal Defense and Criminal Justice Reform

4th Circuit Appeal. We successfully represented D.L. in a prisoner civil rights matter on appeal before the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit.

ACLU of Northern California. We represent ACLU of Northern California in bringing a challenge to the California statute that designates lethal injection as the state's method of execution.

American Civil Liberties Union - Dockery v. Epps. We represent the class of all prisoners, and certain sub-classes, in litigation against the Mississippi Department of Corrections regarding a wide range of prison conditions that violate the Eighth Amendment at the East Mississippi Correctional Facility ("EMCF") in Meridian, MS. Co-counsel are the Southern Poverty Law Center, the National Prison Project of the American Civil Liberties Union, and Elizabeth Alexander.

C.S. We represent an incarcerated client who initially filed a pro se habeas corpus petition in the Southern District of New York challenging the sufficiency of her guilty plea. Our investigation has yielded substantial new evidence of due process violations and ineffective assistance of counsel during the plea proceedings. The habeas petition is currently stayed while we exhaust our client's state remedies on these additional claims through a 440 motion to vacate her conviction.

Campaign 4 Youth Justice. We assisted the Campaign 4 Youth Justice in office lease negotiations, and we provided employment advice. The Campaign 4 Youth Justice is a national campaign dedicated to ending the practice of trying, sentencing, and incarcerating children under 18 in the adult criminal justice system.

Center for Constitutional Rights - K.K. We represented K.K. and others in filing an amicus brief in the Third Circuit supporting reversal of a decision dismissing claims against the City of New York regarding the New York Police Department's surveillance and infiltration of Muslim businesses and organizations in New York and New Jersey.

Challenge to Pretrial Bail Practices. We will file a lawsuit on behalf of a class of indigent defendants against several Maryland counties seeking to enjoin alleged unconstitutional pretrial bail practices.

Criminal Justice Prop. 47 and Expungement Clinic. Firm attorneys receive training and volunteer with Legal Aid Foundation Los Angeles to assist clients with criminal records remedies under California law, primarily for the purpose of obtaining employment. This includes a variety of remedies under the criminal record "expungement" umbrella: Proposition 47 record reclassification, dismissal of past convictions under P.C. 1203.4, and reduction of eligible felonies to misdemeanors. Attorneys also advise clients on background checks, criminal records reporting, and other employment-related issues.

DC Reentry Task Force. We provide advice to the DC Reentry Task Force in connection with Bill 21-463 currently before the DC Council, titled "Incarceration to Incorporation Entrepreneurship Program," which would provide DC residents returning from prison with comprehensive business training to start small businesses.

E.J. We represent an indigent minor in Kings County Juvenile Court in connection with 11 felony counts.

Fourth Circuit - A.M. We represented A.M. in petitioning the Supreme Court of the United States for a writ of certiorari in connection with his habeas corpus appeal. Although our petition was not granted, the Solicitor General elected to file a lengthy brief in opposition to Covington's petition.

Fourth Circuit Appointment - A.B. We represented inmate A.B. in a challenge to his conviction for unlawful possession of a firearm. A.B. received a certificate of unconditional discharge for all of his prior felony convictions. Pursuant to state law, A.B.'s right to possess firearms was automatically restored. Thereafter, the state amended its laws to prohibit persons with prior felony convictions from ever possessing firearms. A.B. was subsequently found in possession of a firearm and charged with violating a federal statute that generally prohibits persons previously convicted of felonies from possessing firearms. His counsel advised him that he had no defense to the charge, and he pleaded guilty pursuant to a plea agreement. The district court concluded that A.B. had three qualifying prior felony convictions and consequently sentenced A.B. to a 15-year mandatory-minimum sentence as an armed career criminal. A.B. thereafter filed a pro se application for a writ of habeas corpus, in which he argued that federal law prohibits consideration of his earlier felony convictions for purposes of his conviction or sentence because his civil rights had been restored for those prior convictions. The district court denied his motion. We represented A.B. in his appeal before the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit. On March 8, 2016, the Fourth Circuit unanimously ruled in A.B.'s favor and vacated his conviction and sentence -- resulting in an across-the-board victory for the client. A.B. was released from custody a short time later.

Fourth Circuit Appointment - A.M.. We represent a Virginia prison inmate in his Section 1983 suit against various Virginia prison officials. Following a successful appeal in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit, the case is now on remand to the Western District of Virginia, where we represented our client in an evidentiary hearing.

Fourth Circuit Appointment - R.A. We drafted briefs and presented oral argument in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Court, successfully overturning a conviction of our client who had been charged as a "felon in possession of a firearm." By demonstrating that our client's prior offense should not have resulted in a felony conviction, we were able to prove that he was innocent of being a "felon in possession of a firearm." The court directed that judgment be entered for our client without a remand.

H.L.R. We assisted this client in the preparation and filing of an expungement petition to dismiss her criminal record. This case was primarily handled by summer associate David Cho under the California State Bar's Practical Training of Law Students program. The expungement was opposed by the D.A. but the judge sided with us and granted the petition.

Human Rights Defense Center. We are engaged in First Amendment litigation relating to government censorship policies at the federal super-max prison, ADX Florence.

I.R. We represent I.R. in a civil forfeiture proceeding in connection with a potential criminal indictment for writing prescriptions without a legitimate medical purpose.

Innocence Network. We will draft and submit an amicus brief to the Ohio Supreme Court on behalf on the Innocence Network on the importance of access to public records for Innocence Network affiliates.

Innocence Project New Orleans - A.J. We successfully represented A.J. in seeking compensation for his wrongful conviction and imprisonment under a Louisiana statute providing for such compensation, resulting in payment in 2012. We then brought a complaint against other defendants. That case survived a motion to dismiss and motion for summary judgment, ultimately in settlement of A.J.'s claims against all remaining defendants.

Innocence Project New Orleans - M.W. We filed a Section 1983 action against the Jefferson Parish District Attorney's Office, Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Office, and individual detectives and prosecutors on behalf of M.W., who was exonerated and released from prison after nearly 16 years with the help of the New Orleans Innocence Project. We also filed a statutory compensation petition for wrongful imprisonment.

Innocence Project New Orleans - M.W. We filed a statutory compensation petition on behalf of M.W. for wrongful imprisonment in connection with our prior representation of M.W. in his Section 1983 civil suit.

Innocence Project New Orleans - R.A. We represent R.A. in litigation in Louisiana arising out of his wrongful prosecution and incarceration. This matter was referred to us by the Innocence Project New Orleans.

J.A. We represent J.A. in appealing a conviction for "felony lynching" in California.

J.M.P., N.H.R., & E.L.S. We submitted an amicus curiae brief in support of the juvenile appellant in State of Ohio v. Brandon Moore in the Supreme Court of Ohio, who is challenging his de facto life sentence as a violation of the Supreme Court's categorical prohibition against life without parole sentences for juvenile non-homicide offenders under the Eighth Amendment.

Justice & Diversity Center - Federal Pro Bono Project - D.G. D.G. is a state prisoner who filed a complaint against prison Correctional Officers. D.G. raises allegations of excessive force while he was in custody at the prison. His complaint survived a summary judgment motion. We represented him for pre-trial proceedings, including fact and expert discovery, and trial. The case recently settled on favorable terms.

Justice & Diversity Center - J.W. We represent J.W., an inmate in the Richard J. Donovan Correctional Facility, in a Section 1983 action against various guards and medical staff in the San Francisco county jail's mental health housing unit for excessive use of force. Through multiple sessions we negotiated a settlement favorable to our client.

Justice Policy Institute. We are providing general corporate, governance, and employment-related advice to the Justice Policy Institute, a nonprofit organization focused on reducing the country's reliance on incarceration and promoting effective and just solutions to social problems.

K.C. In a matter referred by The Bronx Defenders, we represented K.C. in a motion to dismiss assault charges against her in Bronx Criminal Court.

K.K. K.K. is a long suffering domestic violence victim. Based on false statements made to the police by her husband and his relatives, she now faces one count of elder abuse and one count

of domestic violence. The scope of our representation will be to defend K.K. against these charges.

Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights of the San Francisco Bay Area - L.J. The firm is assisting L.J. in sealing her arrest record on the basis of factual innocence.

LCCR Second Chance - N.R. We are assisting a client seeking dismissal of convictions she sustained six years ago so that she might obtain improved housing and employment opportunities.

LCCR Second Chance - R.N. We represent R.N. in his petition for dismissal of convictions in Contra Costa County and related hearings.

Legal Aid Society NYC - W.Q. We brought a 1983 suit for damages against Department of Corrections officers working at Rikers Island for their use of excessive force against our client.

M.F.B. We are representing the client in obtaining a reduction in a probationary period following a suspended sentence for petit larceny, and providing advice with respect to the effect of the probation on immigration status.

Marin County Public Defender's Office. In a longstanding relationship with the Marin County Public Defender's Office, attorneys from our San Francisco office represented various defendants in connection with misdemeanor DUI charges. During 2016, Covington attorneys worked on matters for five clients facing criminal charges.

In addition, our teams resolved numerous other cases on the eve of trial, with favorable pleas negotiated because of our aggressive pretrial investigation and defense.

Neighborhood Legal Services Program - A.S. We are representing the client in proceedings relating to criminal contempt for alleged violation of a civil protection order.

New York Office of the Appellate Defender - D.J. In conjunction with the Office of the Appellate Defender, we are representing D.J. in the appeal of his attempted murder conviction in Bronx County.

New York Office of the Appellate Defender - L.G. In conjunction with the Office of the Appellate Defender, we represent L.G. on appeal of his criminal conviction.

Ninth Circuit Appointment - M.R. M.S. was punished for making a supposed three-way call to the Office of the Inspector General to report threats he received after he filed a grievance against a corrections officer. The Third Department later denied our motion for re-argument and / or leave to appeal to the New York Court of Appeals. In June 2016, the Court of Appeals denied our motion for leave to appeal. For our work on this matter, Colin Watson was nominated for, and won, an NYSBA Access to Justice Award.

R.B. We represent R.B. as court-appointed counsel under the CIA Act to assess the applicability of attorney-client privilege protection to documents collected from the client's prior counsel.

R.S. We represent the client in his resentencing for second degree murder conviction in 1981 as a juvenile.

Representation of M.B. at the Sixth Circuit, Western District of Kentucky, and Kentucky Circuit Court. We represented M.B. before the Sixth Circuit and the Western District of Kentucky. After securing federal habeas relief vacating our client's convictions, we are continuing to represent M.B. in Kentucky circuit court.

Sixth Circuit Appointment - R.D. Pursuant to an appointment by the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals, we represent R.D. in connection with charges of unlawful distribution of a controlled substance and conspiracy to distribute controlled substances.

Sixth Circuit Appointment - S.A. We represented S.A. in connection with his successful appeal to the Sixth Circuit from the dismissal of his habeas petition as "second or successive."

Southern Center for Human Rights. We provide legal and policy advice to the Southern Center for Human Rights in connection with death penalty and prisoner rights matters, indigent defense initiatives, and related criminal justice reform efforts in the Southern United States.

Council for legislative reforms of the juvenile justice system. A model juvenile facility, a keystone of the work plan's requirements, opened in April 2009. Although substantial challenges remain, the number of remaining issues has been winnowed down during the administration of Mayor Bowser.

Third Circuit Appointment - C.H. We represented C.H in his 1983 action against prison officials for denying him timely and effective healthcare.

Mr. Morris is currently appealing the summary dismissal of his post-conviction petition to set aside his conviction and sentence in the Alabama courts. In January 2017, the Alabama Supreme Court granted certiorari on Mr. Morris's claim that he should be allowed to present evidence and receive a ruling on the merits on his claim of ineffective assistance of counsel during the penalty phase of his capital murder trial.

Bobby Baker, Jr. We represent Mr. Baker in a post-conviction proceeding in Alabama state court relating to his capital murder conviction and resulting death sentence. This matter was referred to Covington by the Southern Center for Human Rights.

Edward Russell DuBose. In 1991, Mr. DuBose was referred to Covington by the Alabama Capital Representation Resource Center (now known as the Equal Justice Initiative). In the early 1990s, we won a reversal of Russell DuBose's conviction and sentence of death for the capital murder of a young woman based on a claim of denial of due process and the right to counsel arising from the State of Alabama's refusal to provide Mr. DuBose with a DNA expert. On remand, we persuaded the State to offer Mr. DuBose a sentence of life with possibility of parole in exchange for a plea of guilty to simple (non-capital) murder. After a number of delays, Mr. DuBose has had two parole hearings. Although parole has thus far been denied, we understand that this may be a long process and we look forward to Mr. DuBose's next opportunity for parole. In the meantime, we have responded to requests for assistance by Mr. DuBose regarding his conditions of confinement.

Garrett Dotch. The firm is representing Mr. Dotch in a retrial in a capital murder case. The firm previously was successful during the state habeas process in obtaining full relief from his capital sentence, for both the guilt and penalty phases. The firm also previously represented Mr. Dotch in his direct appeals. Mr. Dotch was referred to Covington by the Equal Justice Initiative.

Gregory Robinson. Mr. Robinson was convicted of first degree murder and sentenced to death in 1998 and is seeking federal habeas relief in the District Court for the Western District of Tennessee, following the state courts' rejection of his claims for post-conviction relief. We collaborated with the Tennessee Office of the Post-Conviction Defender in the state post-conviction proceedings and took the lead on Mr. Robinson's appeal to the Tennessee Court of Criminal Appeals, filing extensive briefs on his behalf and arguing before that court in August 2012. In March 2013, the Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the post-conviction trial court's decision. Thereafter, the Tennessee Supreme Court denied our petition for leave to appeal, and the US Supreme Court denied our petition for certiorari. We filed a federal habeas petition on Mr. Robinson's behalf and submitted a motion contending that the claims should be subject to de novo review by the federal court.

Jerry Layne Rogers. Mr. Rogers was convicted of capital murder and sentenced to death by the State of Florida in 1984. We have represented him since 1995 in seeking to overturn his conviction and sentence. We went through an arduous post-conviction process aimed at establishing a Brady violation based on police reports and other information withheld from the

defense at trial. We also pursued separate challenges to three other robbery convictions that had been used against Mr. Rogers in his murder trial as substantive evidence of his guilt in the murder case and to support his death sentence. In February 2001, the Florida Supreme Court reversed Mr. Rogers's 1984 murder conviction, accepting our argument that the prosecution had violated Brady by withholding several key pieces of evidence from the defense. The Florida Supreme Court remanded for a new trial on the murder charge. Our team defended Mr. Rogers through a two-week trial in the summer of 2002. Although the jury returned a guilty verdict, it recommended a life sentence, which the judge imposed. We appealed the guilty verdict to Florida's Fifth District Court of Appeal, which affirmed the conviction. We filed a jurisdictional brief with the Florida Supreme Court in order to challenge the Fifth District's ruling, but the court declined to take jurisdiction. We fully briefed a habeas petition, which was before the United States District Court for the Middle District of Florida. The habeas petition was denied and our request for a certificate of appealability was denied by the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals. We simultaneously worked to establish Mr. Rogers's parole eligibility by, inter alia, preparing a motion for the trial court that oversaw Mr. Rogers's 2002 conviction, seeking credit for time served by Mr. Rogers between the 1984 and 2002 convictions. The motion was denied by the trial court in 2007 and the Fifth District affirmed the trial court's decision in 2008. In June 2013, we submitted a clemency petition for a commutation of sentence for Mr. Rogers. As of 2015, we are waiting for a response from one of the two members of the Clemency Board who received the petition. We continue to explore opportunities for challenging Jerry's sentences.

Michael Brandon Kelley. We represent Michael Brandon Kelley in a direct appeal following his capital murder conviction and resulting death sentence. Mr. Kelly was referred to the firm by the Southern Center for Human Rights.

Michael Shannon Taylor. The firm is representing an Alabama death row inmate, Mr. Taylor, in seeking federal habeas relief from murder conviction and death sentence. Mr. Taylor was referred to Covington by the Legal Aid Society of New York City.

Court of Appeals affirmed these rulings in August 2012. Covington has continued to represent H.M. in D.C. Superior Court, including in an action to undo a fraudulent conveyance of an interest in the marital home from H.M.'s husband to his adult son from a previous marriage. In July 2013, after

a full trial, the D.C. Superior Court voided the fraudulent conveyance and held that H.M was entitled to full ownership of the home.

evictions. The project has provided Covington associates with opportunities to engage directly with clients, to negotiate with opposing counsel, and with stand-up courtroom experience. Covington attorneys assisted our clients to reach several favorable settlements that kept our clients in their homes, ensured that housing code violations were repaired, and reduced or eliminated outstanding rent balances.

We work with our partner organization Bread for the City on these cases.

This matter follows other successful work for the Law Center. In December 1988, we secured for the Law Center and other plaintiffs permanent injunctive relief against various violations of Title V, including the withholding of eligible property, by federal agencies. We secured further injunctive relief against continuing (and additional) violations of Title V and its implementing regulations in May 1989, February 1991, and in an order of April 1993 that consolidated the relief granted in the previous orders. In June 2011, the Government moved to vacate the Court's most recent, comprehensive injunctive order requiring the government to comply with Title V and its implementing regulations. In order to respond effectively to the motion, we requested formal discovery from the relevant agencies regarding their compliance with Title V. After they refused to provide any discovery, we successfully sought judicial relief and discovery was ordered. After intensive written and deposition discovery, we filed an opposition to the Government's 2011 vacate motion. In March 2013, the Federal District Court for the District of Columbia denied the Government's motion to vacate and granted the Law Center's motion to modify/expand the current injunction. The Court found troubling indications of widespread noncompliance in the form of landbanking, and rejected all of the Government's claims that vacate was warranted. In December 2013, the Court also granted our attorney fee petition. The Government declined to appeal. In addition to this case, we also provide advice from time to time regarding the scope and application of the McKinney Act with respect to threatened changes to the Act. Since the court's order, we have continued to monitor the Government's compliance with the Title V program.

O.M., G.D., R.D. We are representing the clients in an unlawful detainer action initiated by their landlord in Santa Clara County Court.

ONE DC. We co-counsel with the Washington Lawyers Committee to represent OneDC and individual tenants in fair housing matters related to the redevelopment of the Brookland Manor apartment complex.

Rebuilding Together of Washington, D.C., Inc. We continue to provide general corporate advice to Rebuilding Together of Washington, DC.

At the same time, the Covington team negotiated directly with the District's Deputy Mayor for Health and Human Services to amend the protocol. In late 2016, the District issued a revised protocol, incorporating most of the amendments proposed by Covington. Under the revised protocol, residents are entitled to at least 48 hours' posted notice before any clearing. Also, the District must store certain belongings for up to 90 days upon request or if unattended. Bicycles, tents, and important personal documents, often critical for homeless residents' survival and (re)integration into society, must also be preserved. The team continues to monitor implementation of the revised protocol.

Plaintiffs also alleged that they were abused by prison guards and officials during their detention, and that this treatment was based on their religion and ethnic group.

Cyrus R. Vance Center for International Justice - Blacksmith Institute. Over the last three years, and at the behest originally of the Cyrus R. Vance Center for International Justice, Covington has been working with a New York-based NGO known as Pure Earth (formerly the Blacksmith Institute) in an effort to persuade authorities in Mexico to enforce existing prohibitions against the use of lead-oxide in the glazing of traditional pottery and ceramic

products, and to ensure that affordable alternatives are made available to artisans and will reach Mexican households.

When pottery is produced in lower-temperature, wood-fired kilns (which are typically used by artisans in rural areas of Mexico, as opposed to higher-temperature, gas-fired kilns), and then finished with lead-based glaze, the lead that is applied will eventually leach into food that is cooked or consumed in that pottery. Frequent use of these pots or dishes results in lead exposure for millions of Mexican households, with severe public health consequences particularly among the poorer sectors of the population. For a variety of reason (including budget constraints and cuts across the federal government, and the perceived sensitivity of interfering with a traditional artisanal practice), the relevant Mexican government agencies have historically been unable or unwilling to address this public health threat. Covington's assignment was to help Pure Earth in bringing this issue to the attention of the government at the highest levels, and in pushing for the design of an effective government strategy.

Pure Earth, working together with Mexico's public health research institute (Instituto Nacional de Salud Pública, or INSP), has performed tests (including measuring blood levels of lead in newborns whose mothers were regular users of lead-glazed ceramics, and testing product that is sold or consumed in typical markets) and surveyed the existing technical literature with a view to provide evidence that the use of lead-based glaze in the production of traditional ceramics (a) is causing significant harm to tens of thousands of children every year who may suffer irreversible neurological injury, and (b) results in increased long-term risk of cardiovascular and other disease in the country at large. Pure Earth and INSP have found that significant percentages (as much as 15% in urban centers and as much as 20% in affected rural areas) of the population have blood lead levels that are very significantly above what is considered safe or acceptable by the World Health Organization or U.S. authorities.

With Covington's help and participation, Pure Earth and INSP were then able to present their research, and to outline concrete, cost-efficient strategies for replacing lead-based glaze with alternative, lead-free additives, to the most senior officials in Mexico's Ministry of Health, Mexico's FDA-equivalent (Comisión Federal para la Protección contra Riesgos Sanitarios, or COFEPRIS), the Mexican public healthcare system (Instituto Mexicano del Seguro Social), Mexico's Ministry of Social Development (SEDESOL) and members of the Mexican Congress. At the conclusion of these meetings and in response specifically to the evidence presented, the Minister of Health personally instructed COFEPRIS to put in place, as a government priority, a program aimed specifically at eliminating the use of lead-based glaze in traditional ceramics and making a cost-efficient lead-free alternative available generally to artisans. In response, COFEPRIS has now formally adopted an expansive reading of existing norms so that the supply to artisans of lead-based glaze can be stopped (as opposed to punishing the artisans for using a lead-oxide substance that was being marketed to them). This was an important change in government policy. COFEPRIS is also working on putting in place measures that will make the lead-free alternatives readily available to artisans and make the benefits of using it known to the artisans themselves and to the population at large.

Over the last several months, Covington together with senior Pure Earth and INSP representatives have met repeatedly with COFEPRIS's leadership to review the design of this program and to follow the early stages of implementation. Full implementation could save millions of children from significant harm to their health, from developmental impairment and from loss of educational and other opportunity. COFEPRIS will make a formal announcement of the program in mid-2017, and has consistently acknowledged the important contribution of Pure

Earth (and Covington) in bringing it into existence. Pure Earth continues to expand its activities in Mexico and will work closely with COFEPRIS in monitoring enforcement and other measures.

Defiant Requiem Foundation. The firm advises Defiant Requiem Foundation (DRF) about issues that may arise in relation to the concert and the development of educational materials associated with it. We have provided advice on contract and IP issues.

F.G. We provided strategic advice to F.G. regarding legal and policy options that may be available for the release of her son from the custody of the Iranian government.

FINCA (UK). We provide advice to FINCA (UK) in a range of areas, including corporate, employment, and tax. FINCA (UK) is a subsidiary of FINCA International.

We have also provided advice on employment and non-compete issues and have represented FINCA on several claims asserted by current and former employees.

For Our Communities. We represent a charitable entity established to assist in developing economic and cultural opportunities for rural youth in Africa. We are working with Dr. Auma Obama, who operates a program called Sauti Kuu that empowers young people in Alego, the ancestral homeland of the Obama family, to identify and develop opportunities in that rural region to stem the migration of youth to the slums surrounding Nairobi.

GABRIELA-DC. We will be representing a group of Filipino women who were trafficked by recruiter Isidro Rodriguez and working to encourage the prosecution of the adverse parties for human trafficking offenses.

GoodWeave USA. We are providing general corporate advice to this nonprofit organization working to end child labor in the carpet industry in South Asia. We advise generally on governance, contract, and intellectual property matters.

Guantanamo Detainees. In 2004, Covington entered the Guantanamo Bay habeas litigation by agreeing to represent 12 Yemeni detainees. In the thirteen years since, Covington has represented more than 20 men imprisoned at Guantanamo. Today, that number is down to two. Five firm clients were among 15 detainees resettled to the United Arab Emirates in September 2016. All five had been held at Guantanamo since 2002. None was ever charged with a crime. All were approved for transfer by the unanimous consent of six federal agencies, including the Departments of Defense, Homeland Security, Justice, and State; the Joint Chiefs of Staff; and the Office of the Director of National Intelligence. One client had been approved for transfer as early as 2009, while the other four were approved for transfer by administrative hearings (similar to parole hearings) between 2014 and 2016. Prior to September's transfer, six other firm clients

had been resettled in 2016: two in Montenegro, two in Oman, one in Saudi Arabia, and one in the United Arab Emirates. Two additional clients were released in January of 2017.

Helping Children Worldwide. We are reviewing contracts and providing policy advice on economic development issues for this Northern Virginia-based 501(c)(3) that operates a hospital and child rescue center in Bo, Sierra Leone.

International Justice Mission - End Modern Slavery Initiative. We will conduct research on the End Modern Slavery Initiative, a bill currently pending before the U.S. Congress.

We Players presents site-integrated performances utilizing public spaces, creating a participatory experience for its audiences. The agreements deal with IP ownership/licensing rights between the theater and its collaborators, as well as commercial and other obligations between the parties.

Miscellaneous Representations

Advisory Committee on Residential Family Centers. Howard Berman advises on aspects of immigration law relevant to the Committee's work.

Advisory Neighborhood Commission 6B. The Advisory Neighborhood Commission 6B represents the interests of the Capitol Hill Southeast neighborhood to the government of the District of Columbia. ANCs are made up of approximately ten locally-elected Commissioners, who serve two-year terms without pay, and are the level of District of Columbia government that is closest to the people. In late 2015, the Hine Coalition, a group of Capitol Hill residents who oppose the Hine Development currently under construction near Eastern Market, filed a FOIA request seeking emails and documents relating to the ANC 6B's approval of the Hine Development. We are advising the client in negotiating the scope of the request and preparing its response.

Amicus Brief - U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit. We will act as court-appointed amicus curiae in *West v. Lynch* in the DC Circuit.

Bronx Defenders - V.C. In a matter referred by The Bronx Defenders, we successfully represented the client in a suit against the NYPD Legal Department to regain possession of her car, which was seized by police when her husband was arrested.

C.M. We will represent the client in submitting an application for social security disability benefits to the Social Security Administration.

Additionally, we counseled D.C. small businesses in a brief advice clinic.

Following a hearing in which the Judge expressed considerable skepticism that BMFA had actually sold the painting, BMFA and our clients entered into a settlement pursuant to which BMFA returned the painting to our clients in a fancy new frame.

To date, 32 attorneys have participated in the rotation. The attorneys who participated in 2016 were Maggie Brennan and David Parker. The paralegals who participated in 2016 were Stephanie Lalley and Diondra Hicks.

Neighborhood Legal Services Program. Under an arrangement established in 1969, the firm assigns a team consisting of two lawyers and a paralegal to work at Neighborhood Legal Services Program (NLSP) full-time for a six-month period. Together with regular NLSP staff members, the Covington team provides legal assistance in civil cases to indigent residents of the District of Columbia. Since its inception, approximately 200 attorneys have participated in the rotation. The attorneys who participated in 2016 were Lily Rudy, Lindsay Windsor, Tony Lopez, and Amy Bond. The paralegals who participated in 2016 were James "Hunter" Williams and Idun Klakegg. The firm also funds two Covington & Burling Westwood Fellows at NLSP. The Fellows are recent graduates of either D.C. law schools or the University of Maryland who work as NLSP staff attorneys.

Cardozo Saturday Academy Program. The program is an academic enrichment program coordinated by Hattie Blackshire. The Saturday Academy has been operated at the firm since the 1990s as part of our longstanding partnership with Cardozo. No legal services are provided at Saturday Academy.
